

2018 ANNUAL REPORT

EXTRAORDINARY DOGS, TRANSFORMING LIVES

DEAR MEMBERS OF THE BOARD,

Our most recent fiscal year ended on June 30, 2018, and I'm pleased to share this State of the School Report with you.

We ensured the health, wellness, and progress of **more than 1,000 dogs**, including puppies and dogs training on our campus, dogs training in puppy raiser homes, and active guide and service dogs working across the United States.

- We placed **283 puppies** into the training pipeline and continued to maintain a leadership role in the ABC Breeding Cooperative, a consortium of 28 working-dog organizations throughout North America, improving genetics, ensuring diversity in the breeding lines, and creating the highest quality guide and service dogs for people with disabilities.
- We implemented the first phase of our **pioneering canine conditioning program**, advancing as the only one of its kind in the working-dog world. We now use a variety of rehabilitation equipment to provide strength training and conditioning to prevent injury, build muscle mass and reduce kennel stress. Current therapies include soft tissue laser treatments, massage therapy, aroma therapy, electro-acupuncture¹, treadmill conditioning, Cavaletti rail² workouts, and thermal imaging for diagnosing inflammation or weak circulation. And once we complete the remodeling of our veterinary center and the construction of our new canine aquatic center, our dogs will enjoy using our new hydrotherapy water treadmills, our new swimming pool for low-impact fitness, and our new hyperbaric chamber, which will build muscle mass through hyperoxygenation.
- We placed **100 dogs** into impactful, life-changing careers benefitting people with vision loss and veterans with PTSD and other disabilities. In addition, we placed **13 wonderful dogs into public service careers** and **32 dogs into our breeding program**.
- We provided personalized follow-up services to about 550 alumni in 43 states.
 including guide dog, service dog, and facility therapy dog handlers.
- Our students reported a 99.9% overall satisfaction rating in their class exit surveys.
- And our graduates reported a 97% satisfaction rating in our annual graduate survey.
- We maximized our impact and minimized costs by remaining strong as a volunteer-based organization with more than 750 core volunteers, including campus volunteers, puppy raisers, and breeder hosts. These considerate individuals contributed about \$13 million worth of service hours, though, in fact, they are invaluable. This enabled us to remain lean while building a culture of caring.

- We raised nearly **\$16 million in revenues**, versus a budget of \$10 million, while keeping our expenses slightly under budget.
- In addition, through the efforts of our marketing department, we garnered **\$7 million in in-kind contributions** of advertising services and space from a local, regional, and national network of media and business partners.
- We increased our net assets by about \$5 million to \$51 million.
- On August 4, we dedicated our new Canine University facilities—including our Canine Residence Halls and our Canine Training Center—one month early and about \$250,000 under budget.
- And later this year, we will complete the construction of our new East Parking Lot, which
 has been fully funded thanks to the generosity of Gary and Melody Johnson; and we will
 complete the design for our new Center for Health and Wellness, which has been fully
 funded thanks to the generosity of the Johnson Singer Foundation.

It's been quite a year. Thank you for playing a pivotal role. I'm grateful.

Southeastern Guide Dogs transforms lives by creating and nurturing extraordinary partnerships between people and dogs. We employ some of the most talented and innovative scientists and trainers in the working-dog industry and operate the most advanced training facilities of any service dog organization in the world. Our experts train guide dogs, service dogs, and skilled companion dogs for people with visual impairments, veterans with disabilities, and children with significant challenges such as vision loss or loss of a parent in the military.

All of our services—which include selective breeding and expert dog training and conditioning; comprehensive on-campus student instruction; and lifetime alumni support—are provided at no cost to the recipients. We rely 100 percent on private donations and receive no government funding. Southeastern Guide Dogs has the distinction of being dually accredited by the two premier, global accreditation bodies: the International Guide Dog Federation and Assistance Dogs International.
